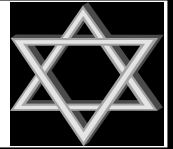

## Links in the chain.

I had the honor and sad duty to conduct a funeral recently for a man I had met only a few days before. He was 92 years old, and he was a survivor of the concentration camps. He told me a small part of his story, and he showed me the numbers tattooed on his arm. He cried and told me, "I see my mother standing in front of me, and the Nazis take her away to be killed. I never see her again."

He was a witness, and now he is gone. Every year the number of witnesses grows smaller. The youngest survivors who have any memory of the atrocities committed in the name of Aryan superiority are now in their mid-seventies. Within the foreseeable future, there will be no direct witnesses left to tell the story.

When I was a student at Rutgers (many years ago), Elie Wiesel came to speak to my class. He called himself a "story teller." When someone asked him if that was an appropriate description for such a prominent author, he replied that telling the important stories of a people has always been an honored and important task. Without a collective memory of a community carried forward by their stories, that people is in danger of perishing.

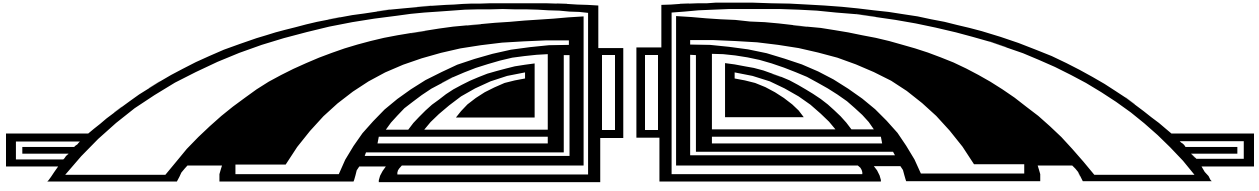
One of the obligations of a community is to carry on the common memory, to tell the important stories to the next generation. That is the reason that the Torah is read in Jewish congregations throughout the world, every week. That is one of the reasons that it is important to belong to a community – to help our children inherit the story of our people and become part of it. Only by being part of the community do we get the honor of carrying that story forward.

We have an obligation to our past and our future to become the witnesses when those who lived through the holocaust can no longer tell their tales. We have an obligation to carry the truth because there are so many who would deny that it ever happened. We have the honor of being part of a sacred community, and part of our mission is to carry the stories of our people forward.

The High Holidays are approaching. Now is the time that we take stock of our lives and make amends to those who are part of our lives whom we have hurt or wronged. I extend my hand to each of you and ask forgiveness. I will try my hardest to do better this year.

**President's Message**

**The State of Judaism (New Jersey)**

At the beginning of the Summer, in a Shabbat sermon, Rabbi Kramer touched upon the subject of **Aaron Louzada**, a Jewish pioneer who was one of the early settlers of Bound Brook, NJ in the late 17<sup>th</sup> century. His family maintained a presence in the Bound Brook area for nearly 150 years. How difficult that colonial period must've been for the Louzada family, and yet, there are successful stories of Jewish pioneers throughout America's past. They are wonderful stories to relate to in our centuries old experience in America.

It was over 85 years ago that a band of Jewish merchants and professionals in the Bound Brook area decided to make their Jewish presence permanent here with the creation of the Bound Brook Jewish Center. In the early 1950s this was to become the *shul* we now know as Congregation Knesseth Israel (or CKI). CKI has the pleasant distinction of being one of the oldest Jewish communities in central suburban New Jersey. When CKI was founded in 1923/1924, synagogue life and Jewish life were synonymous. The importance of having a synagogue was paramount to the early members of CKI. Judaism was the focal point of their daily lives. This early community struggled through bouts of anti-Semitism in early 20<sup>th</sup> century America; the Great Depression; World War II and the Holocaust. After that dark period, CKI members gave great support to the founding of Israel and its subsequent defense. All along, the pioneer CKIers dealt with the distinct line of becoming good (assimilated) Americans while maintaining their Jewish identities.

Today, the fine line of being Jewish and being assimilated has become blurred. I recently saw statistics in *Moment* magazine (a Jewish periodical) that as many as 65% of American Jews are currently not affiliated with *any* synagogue. In addition, many of those who are affiliated merely become so, briefly, for the satisfaction of their children's Bar/Bat-Mitzvah requirements. Shortly after that point, their enrollment "lapses", perhaps not to return again until their Golden Years; perhaps not at all. To add to this dilemma, some Jewish parents now attempt to circumvent the synagogue/temple experience entirely, by seeking "maverick" rabbis who will "fast track" their child to a Bar/Bat-Mitzvah ceremony with the promise of tutoring and preparation in as little as a few months! What does this teach the child about the beauty and mystery of the Hebrew language? How does this teach and develop a love for all things (or for anything) Jewish? How does this become a lasting impression to one's heritage? This is not simply about religion; this is also about culture. Are we becoming a cultureless, soul-less Jewish American society? Are we Jews only in name because we occasionally enjoy a bowl of matzoh ball soup, or a bagel with lox and cream cheese? Is it because we take satisfaction when we hear about a famous sports figure who is Jewish, or we're "entertained" by the notion that certain celebrities are flirting with the Kabbalah? There has to be more to being Jewish today than that. Taking the path of least resistance completely denies the child (and the parents) of belonging to their greater Jewish community. This is a far cry from the needs and emphasis our "Jewish pioneers" placed in their community! The founders of CKI had no doubts or hesitations. For them, Jewish life was a #1 priority. Nowadays, it seems, that emphasis is simply missing, and Jewish life is not even a secondary concern, especially when stories abound of how soccer practice, baseball practice, dance recitals, and every sort of *extracurricular* activity takes precedence over securing a satisfying Jewish education.

I touched upon this subject in a previous article entitled the **Bar-Mitzvah Factory** this past year, but this latest trend may be serving to hasten the demise of the synagogue in America. Is this a failure of Jewish Americans to their community? Or is it a failure of synagogues/temples to their congregations? **Have we become so successful as Americans that we forgot, or even cared about, how to be Jews?** I wish I had the answers, but I do not. Most modern synagogues and temples still offer well balanced opportunities in Hebrew education, spirituality, and culture, as well as religion. CKI is no exception. We even go as far as to offer special accommodations to families and students, provided their requests do not hinder nor compromise the needs of other congregants. It is my desire that we seek answers to all these questions, and we take the opportunity (and courage) to discuss them openly. Furthermore, it is my optimistic hope that CKI will have a wonderful history to bear witness to **in the next 85 years**.

I look forward to your feedback. Perhaps, the upcoming High Holidays will be a time for special renewal this year. I always welcome new ideas, and recommendations. Please don't hesitate to bring your suggestions to me. Congregation Knesseth Israel will always remain a place of openness and friendship.

*We are now preparing for the High Holiday services, which begin this year with Selichot Services on Saturday September 20<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 PM.*

*Erev Rosh Hashanah services will be Monday evening, September 29<sup>th</sup>, at 8:00 pm. Services for the first day of Rosh Hashanah begin at 9:30 am on Tuesday, September 30<sup>th</sup>, Tashlich services will be held immediately after. Mincha / Ma'ariv Services will begin at 7:00 PM. Services for the second day of Rosh Hashanah begin at 9:30 on Wednesday, October 1<sup>st</sup>. Baby-sitters (for children up through age 7) will be available during the Rosh Hashanah services. Cantor Fuerstman will assist Rabbi Kramer at all services.*

*This year we will hold both Friday evening and Saturday morning services on Shabbat Shuvah (October 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup>).*

*Erev Yom Kippur services (Kol Nidrei) start at 8:00 pm on Wednesday, October 8<sup>th</sup>. Yom Kippur services start at 9:30 am on Thursday, October 9<sup>th</sup>. Baby-sitting services will be available both days. Yizkor services will start at about 12:30 pm. Our annual "Break the Fast" will commence at the conclusion of the evening service.*

*Sign up forms for the Break the Fast will be distributed separately. We are looking for volunteers to help with the Break the Fast. If you would like to help, please contact the Temple Office.*

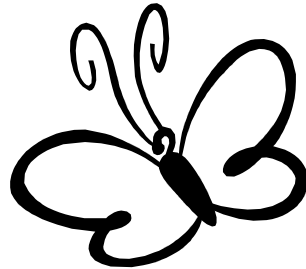

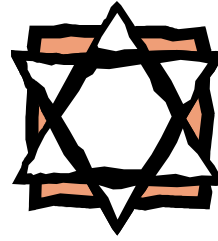

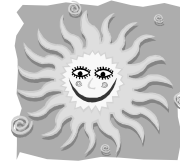
